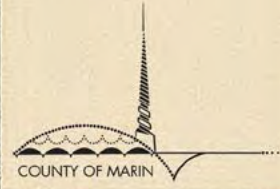


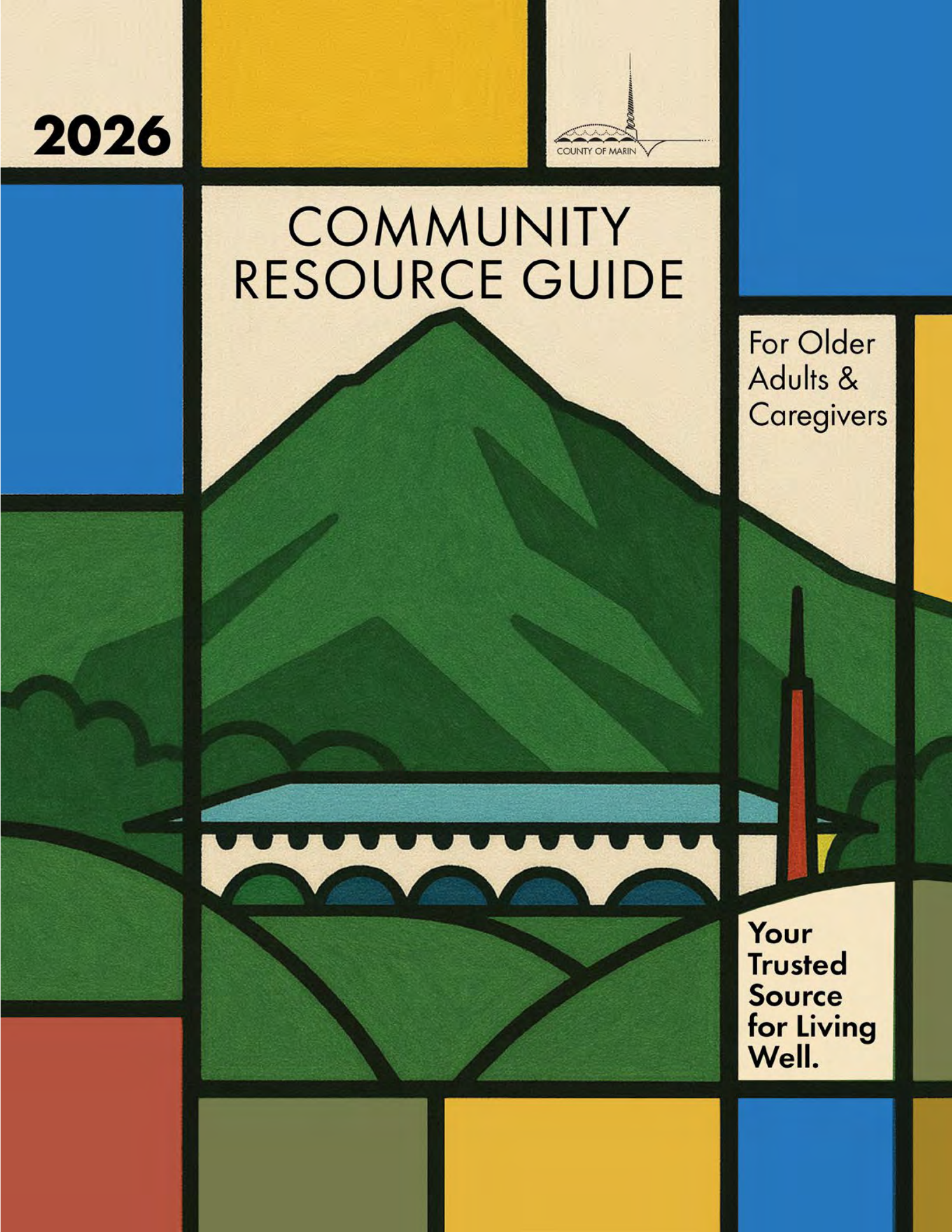
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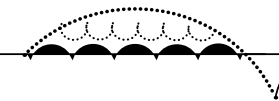

The County of Marin is committed to fostering a community where everyone can age with dignity, purpose, and connection. We hope this guide supports that vision and serves as a trusted resource.

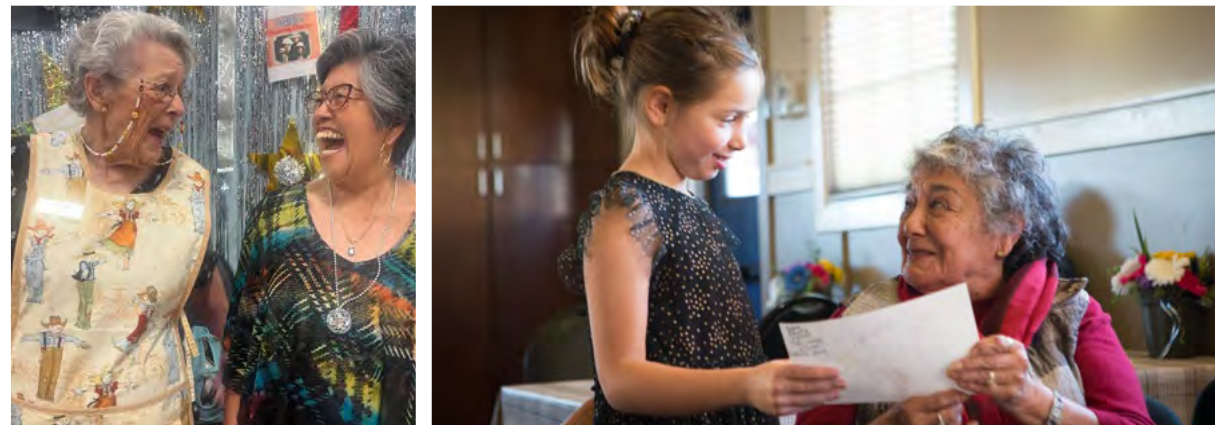

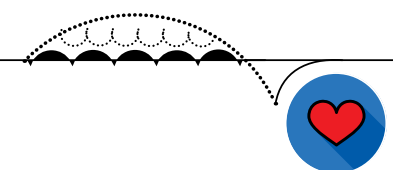

Choosing the Right In-Home Help

Not sure of what kind of help is needed – or where to start? Fortunately, there are many ways to approach finding the right support.

Please note: All of these agencies accept Long Term Care insurance.



Home Care Agencies

Home Care Agencies offer non-medical or custodial, companion and personal care that ranges from shopping and transportation to assistance with all activities of daily living (ADLs), such as bathing, dressing, grooming toileting, mobility, nutrition and light housekeeping. Caregivers may be companions, certified home health aides (HHA) or certified nursing assistants (CNA).

Home Care Agencies collaborate with the client to develop a plan of care and supervise the caregiver. Home Care Agencies are the employer of record and pay worker's compensation and liability insurance as well as the employer portion of the payroll taxes. Clients should confirm caregiver's bonding and liability insurance.



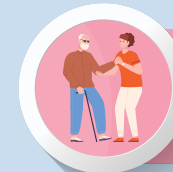
Home Care Referral Agencies

Home Care Referral Businesses place or refer caregivers who provide non-medical or custodial, companion and personal care that ranges from shopping and transportation to assistance with all activities of daily living (ADLs) including bathing, dressing, grooming toileting, mobility, nutrition and light housekeeping. Caregivers may be companions, certified home health aides (HHA) or certified nursing assistants (CNA).

Home Care Referral Agencies collaborate with the client to develop a plan of care. Caregivers are independent contractors, not agency employees. Clients should confirm caregiver's bonding and liability insurance, and determine who is responsible for payroll taxes and workers' compensation insurance.

Marin CIL QuickMatch

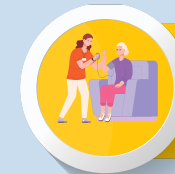
Marin CIL provides a free caregiver registry that connects older adults and people with disabilities with pre-screened independent caregivers. Clients hire, schedule, and supervise caregivers directly, which often is less expensive than going through homecare agencies. quickmatch.org • 415-459-6245 x18



Private Pay Home Care Providers and Registries

Private independent providers of care or registries which offer clients a list of caregivers who provide non-medical or custodial, companion and personal care that ranges from shopping and transportation to assistance with activities of daily living (ADLs) including bathing, dressing, grooming toileting, mobility, preparing meals and light housekeeping. Caregivers may be companions, certified home health aides (HHA) or certified nursing assistants (CNA).

Clients hire and supervise caregivers directly. As the employer of record, clients are responsible for arranging workers' compensation, bonding and liability insurance, and payroll taxes.



Home Health Care and Medicare Certified Agencies

Licensed and/or Medicare-certified agencies that provide medical care at home under a doctor's order for service. Services may include nursing care, physical/occupational therapy, wound care, and medication management. Services are administered by licensed professionals such as RNs, physical therapists, occupational therapists, social workers, and speech therapists in the home.

For MEDI-CAL Recipients

The following public programs provide in-home support, paid for eligible residents by the state of California.

IHSS (In-Home Supportive Services): Public program that pays for in-home help for eligible older adults and disabled individuals of any age on Medi-Cal. Caregivers can be family members. **(Listings on page 7 & 12)**

MSSP (Multipurpose Senior Services Program): This care management program for people on Medi-Cal aged 60 and older enables frail older adults who otherwise would have difficulty living independently to remain in their own homes. In Marin County, MSSP is locally administered by Seniors at Home as part of Jewish Family and Children's Services: **415-449-3700** seniorsathome.jfcs.org.







In-Home Care

Home care is an umbrella term that includes companion services, personal or non-medical care, homemaker services, and medical or skilled care provided by licensed health professionals.

Non-medical care assists individuals who need help with Activities of Daily Living (ADLs) and Instrumental Activities of Daily Living (IADLs). ADLs are basic routine daily tasks including bathing, dressing, eating, managing continence, toileting, and transferring from one position to another (such as getting in and out of bed). IADLs include such things as shopping, cooking, cleaning and doing laundry. Homemaker services also help with IADLs.

Quality in-home care can be expensive but, depending on the amount and type of care, can be less costly than residing in an assisted living or skilled nursing facility. With thoughtful planning, Marin families can find safe and supportive options that fit both care needs and budgets. Following are some tips to help you plan for your care needs.

-  Start by **clarifying needs**. Is support needed for personal care, household tasks, or companionship? Is medical care needed?
-  It's helpful to **compare providers**. Hiring a private caregiver may cost less but means managing payroll and insurance yourself, while agencies are more expensive but handle training, oversight, and liability.
-  Always **ask about payment options**, as some providers accept Medicare, Medi-Cal, long-term care insurance, or offer sliding-scale fees.
-  **Explore respite and volunteer programs** which can provide temporary or reduced-cost relief.
-  Be sure to **check licensing**. California requires home care agencies to be licensed for consumer protection.
-  **Request written estimates** to understand rates, schedules, and what services are included.
-  **Review your contract carefully**. Is there a deposit required? How much? What is the cancellation period and fees, if any?
-  **Ask** each Home Care Agency the following questions:
 -  Are you licensed by the state as a Home Care Organization?
 -  If not, how are you licensed?
 -  Who owns this company?
 -  Do you answer your phone 24/7/365?
 -  Are your caregivers paid employees, i.e., does the company pay the payroll taxes, insure the caregivers and provide liability insurance?
 -  If not, what do I have to do?
 -  Whose insurance pays if the caregiver is hurt on the job or steals from my home?
 -  Can I deduct your bill on my taxes?
 -  What happens if a caregiver does not show up or is sick?
 -  What happens if I don't like the caregiver?

Ready Seniors Emergency Preparedness Checklist for Older Adults & Caregivers

MAKE A PLAN

● **Keep ready somewhere accessible: door, wallet, fridge, or go-bag.**

● Build a support network of at least two to three trusted people (family, neighbors, caregivers).

● Practice your evacuation plan with mobility aid or pet transport scenarios.

● Complete a Family Emergency Plan, including out-of-area contacts and reunification spots.

● Share your plan and key info with your support team.



GET PREPARED & PRACTICE

● Use **ReadyMarin** checklists (go-bag, evacuation, personal documents): readymarin.org

● Attend Get Ready Seniors workshops hosted by Marin County. readymarin.org

● Join CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) training for basic emergency skills. readymarin.org

CONSIDER POWER BACKUP NEEDS

● Enroll in PG&E's Medical Baseline Program for priority notifications and backup options: pge.com

● **Marin Center for Independent Living (Marin CIL) offers:** backup battery program, emergency preparedness training, assistance preparing an emergency plan, and hotel stays if activated during Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) events and winter storms. marincil.org/power-prepared



BUILD A GO-BAG

● Seven-day supply of medications (with dosage list).

● Copies of ID, insurance cards, prescription.

● Flashlight and batteries, extra glasses and hearing aid.

● Water and non-perishable food.

● Mask, sanitizer, hygiene items.

● Emergency contact list, allergies, medical info.

● First-aid kit.

- Agua y alimentos no perecederos
- Mascarilla, desinfectante, artículos de higiene personal.
- Lista de contactos de emergencia, alergias, información médica.
- Mantenga la bolsa en un lugar accesible: junto a la puerta, en la cartera o el refrigerador.

Fire Safety

Fire safety is an essential concern for older adults, particularly in Marin County, where wildfire risk, power outages, and evacuations are part of the local reality. Older adults are more vulnerable to fire-related injuries due to mobility challenges, chronic health conditions, slower reaction times, and reliance on medical equipment or power-dependent systems. Practical steps taken in advance can dramatically reduce risk and increase safety during an emergency.

FIRE SAFETY STARTS AT HOME

Working smoke alarms are critical.

Install smoke alarms inside and outside sleeping areas and on every level of your home. Test them monthly and replace batteries at least once a year, or immediately if an alarm chirps. If possible, use interconnected alarms so when one sounds, they all do.

Keep exits clear and accessible.

Make sure hallways, doorways, and stairways are free of clutter. Know at least two ways out of every room, and confirm that doors and windows open easily. If you use a walker, cane, or wheelchair, factor that into your exit planning.

Pay special attention to kitchens and heaters.

Cooking is the leading cause of home fires. Stay in the kitchen when cooking, keep flammable items away from the stove, and turn pot handles inward. Keep space heaters at least three feet from furniture, curtains, and bedding, and turn them off when leaving the room.

Have fire extinguishers, and know how to use them.

Place a multipurpose fire extinguisher in the kitchen and near heating equipment. Make sure it's charged and that you understand how to operate it safely.

PLAN FOR POWER OUTAGES AND EVACUATIONS

In Marin County, fires and Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS) can lead to sudden power outages. One important tip shared by local firefighters is to install a battery backup for your garage door opener. A functioning battery backup can ensure you can exit quickly when the power is out.

Every household should have a written evacuation plan, including:

- Primary and secondary exit routes
- A meeting place outside the home
- A plan for pets, medications, mobility aids, and medical devices
- A go-bag

STAY INFORMED: SIGN UP FOR ALERTS

During fast-moving emergencies, timely information can save lives. **Sign up for local emergency alerts**, including evacuation notices, air quality warnings, and power outage updates. Fire Safe Marin provides clear guidance on how to receive safety updates and connect to trusted alert systems such as AlertMarin. Visit firesafemarin.org.

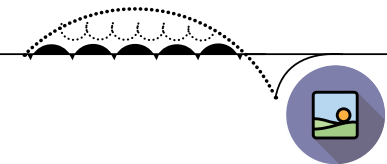
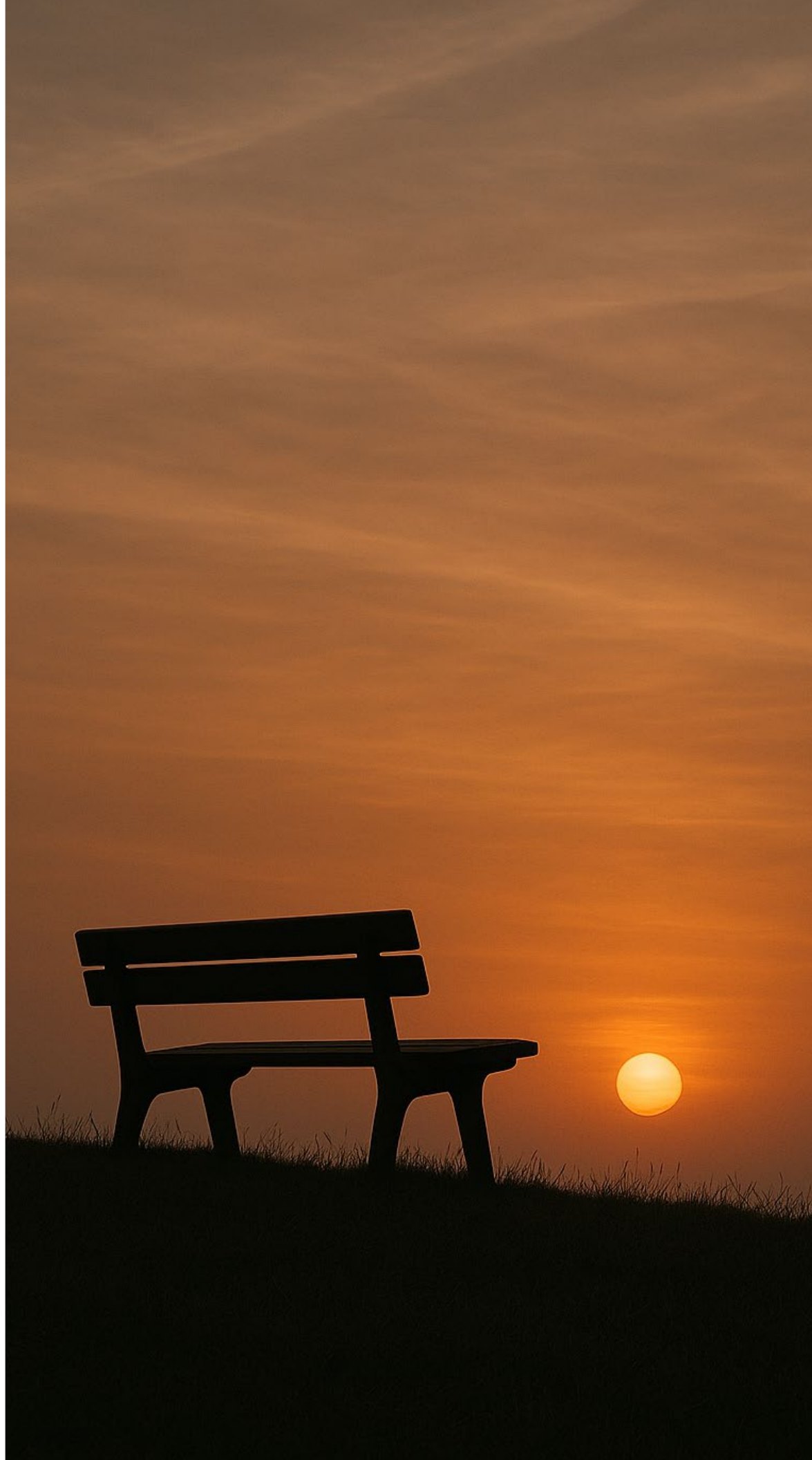

11 Documents & Records to Have on Hand

Planning ahead can make a difficult time a little easier for the people you love. One day, your family may need important information quickly, about your medical wishes, finances, insurance, accounts, and key contacts. Having a few essential documents organized and easy to find can help ensure your preferences are honored and reduce stress during a crisis or after a death.

These documents can also help protect your assets and clarify who is authorized to make decisions on your behalf. Without a will, trust, or other legal plan, your money and property are generally distributed according to California law, which may not match your wishes.

If you're considering setting up a trust or estate plan, choose a reputable professional and be cautious of anyone pressuring you to sign quickly or pay large upfront fees. The California Department of Justice offers consumer guidance to help you avoid fraud.



POLST Form

Understanding Hospice Care

Hospice care provides medical comfort care support for individuals with a life-limiting illness whose lifespan is judged by a doctor to be six months or less. Focus is on symptom management and emotional and spiritual support for the patient and their families through long-term care insurance.

When is it time to consider hospice?

The hospice conversation is typically precipitated by a terminal diagnosis or debility resulting from a chronic condition, illness or aging. Unplanned weight loss, deterioration of mental capacity, increased time sleeping, or the inability to perform Activities of Daily Living (ADLs) are often early signs that hospice is appropriate.

Who pays for hospice?

Hospice is usually paid for by Medicare Part A and Medi-Cal (Medicaid). Hospice is rarely paid for out of pocket.

Services Include:

- Pain and symptom management
- Emotional and spiritual support
- Family support
- Durable medical equipment

How do hospice & home care differ?

Hospice services are provided by Medicare on a per visit basis. Home care provides continuous care paid for out of pocket or through long-term care insurance.

Hospice vs. Palliative Care: What is the Difference?

Hospice and palliative care both focus on comfort and support, but they differ in timing, treatment approach, and coverage. Hospice is for those nearing the end of life, while palliative care can begin at any stage of a serious illness. Both may be covered by Medicare, Medi-Cal (Medicaid), and private insurance, but certain palliative services – especially in-home care – may require private payment.

How to Talk with Your Adult Children About End of Life Plans

Talking about end-of-life wishes isn't easy, but it can be one of the most meaningful gifts you give your family. By sharing your values and preferences now, you help ease the burden on your loved ones later. In Marin, where many families juggle caregiving and planning across generations, these conversations can bring clarity and peace of mind.

Choose the right moment. Pick a calm, unhurried time when you and your children can talk openly without distractions. A family meal, a walk, or a quiet evening at home can set the stage.

Start with your values. Instead of jumping straight to medical details, talk about what matters most to you such as comfort, independence, spiritual traditions, or time at home. This provides a foundation for specific decisions.

Be honest and clear. Share your wishes about medical care, living arrangements, and memorial preferences in straightforward language. Written documents, such as advance directives, can back up your words.

Invite questions. Encourage your children to share their feelings and ask what role they might play. Listening is just as important as speaking.

Keep the conversation ongoing. Plans and health needs change. Revisiting the topic over time shows your children that it's a process, not a one-time talk.

Clear the air. Talking about end-of-life wishes may feel difficult, but these conversations often bring families closer and prevent confusion in times of crisis and regret for not sharing love, appreciation and forgiveness or other important thoughts at the appropriate time.

Cover the important topics. It is important to discuss topics such as hospice versus palliative care, funeral service, traditional or green burial, cremation or hydrolysis and placement of your remains, celebration of life, legal documents you have in place, etc.

With compassion and preparation, you ensure everyone's voice will be heard and respected while giving you and your loved ones peace of mind when the time comes.



Burial, Cremation, and Other Options

In California, options include burial, cremation, or aquamation (alkaline hydrolysis).



Costs to be aware of

Cemetery and provider costs vary widely. In addition to a plot or niche, fees may include:

- Opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, administrative or grounds fees, and sometimes an outer burial container.
- Always ask for an itemized General Price List (GPL) to understand what is required versus optional. Caskets or containers may be purchased from another provider.

Cremation and aquamation

Not all providers offer aquamation, and some use outside facilities. You may wish to ask where services are performed, how remains are tracked, and whether family members may be present.

Planning and decision-making

- Ask what documents to bring, including identification, veteran paperwork, or pre-planning documents. Some medical devices, such as pacemakers, must be removed before cremation.
- California law sets the order for who may make burial or disposition decisions. An overview is available through the California Cemetery & Funeral Bureau at cfb.ca.gov.

Placement and cemetery requirements

- Most options require a cemetery plot, grave space, or niche. Exceptions may apply for those eligible for burial in a veterans cemetery.
- Placement options vary by cemetery and may include mausoleum crypts, columbariums or niches for cremated remains, cremation plots or graves, scattering gardens, or green burial if offered.

Funeral Services

When someone dies, decisions often need to be made quickly. This overview highlights what to consider, what information you may need, and where to find trusted guidance in California.

Start with a trusted California resource

The *California Cemetery & Funeral Bureau: Consumer Guide* explains burial, cremation, pre-planning, and consumer rights in clear terms. Reviewing it before meeting with a funeral provider can be helpful. cfb.ca.gov

Who can make final decisions?

If no written instructions were left, California law generally follows this order:

- The person named in an Advance Health Care Directive (if applicable)
- Spouse or registered domestic partner
- A majority of adult children

If there is disagreement, a funeral home may delay arrangements until the legal decision-maker is clear.

Before meeting with a funeral home

You may want to think about:

- Viewing or visitation
- Religious or cultural services
- Memorial or celebration of life
- Obituary or notice

How to help ensure your wishes are followed

Putting your preferences in writing can make things easier:

- Be clear and specific
- Share your wishes with those involved
- Consider how costs will be covered

Information you may be asked to provide

- Social Security number
- Mother's maiden name
- Parents' places of birth
- Veteran discharge papers (DD-214), if applicable

Costs and your rights

By law, funeral homes must provide clear pricing:

- Prices may be requested by phone
- A General Price List (GPL) must be provided in person
- You may purchase a casket or cremation container from any provider

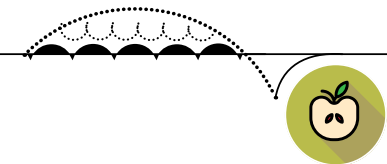

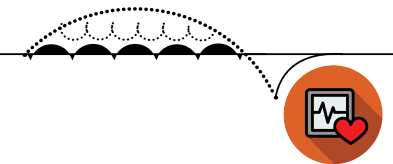

Affording Healthcare

Healthcare costs can be overwhelming, especially if you are managing chronic conditions or living on a fixed income. The good news is that there are programs in Marin designed to help ease the burden. Understanding what's available and knowing where to turn can make a real difference.



Review your coverage. Medicare, Medi-Cal, and supplemental insurance all cover different services. Take time to review your benefits annually and make sure you're enrolled in the plan that best fits your needs.



Look into assistance programs. Programs offered by government agencies and nonprofits can help pay for premiums, prescription drugs, co-pays, medical equipment, dental care, and transportation. If you're unsure where to start, a benefits counselor can help you identify programs and complete applications at no cost.



Ask about sliding-scale services. Many clinics and service providers in Marin offer reduced fees based on income. Don't hesitate to ask – these programs exist to make care accessible.



Consider counseling and advocacy. Trained counselors can help you compare plans, apply for benefits, and navigate confusing medical bills. These services are free and confidential.



Plan for the long term. If you anticipate needing in-home care or long-term support, start exploring financial planning and assistance options early. This reduces stress and opens up more choices later.

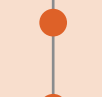

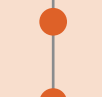

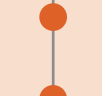

Fall Prevention

Falls are one of the leading causes of injury among older adults, but many falls can be prevented. In Marin, where many older adults enjoy active lifestyles at home and in the community, taking a few proactive steps can help maintain independence and safety.



Make your home safer. Remove clutter, secure loose rugs, and add grab bars in bathrooms and railings on both sides of stairs. Good lighting, especially at night, reduces risk.



Review your medications. Some prescriptions can cause dizziness or drowsiness. Ask your doctor or pharmacist to check for side effects or interactions that might affect your balance.



Stay active. Regular exercise, such as walking, tai chi, or gentle strength training, helps improve balance, coordination, and flexibility. Many local programs offer classes designed specifically for older adults.



Get vision and hearing checked. Regular exams help ensure you can see obstacles and hear warnings, like approaching cars or alarms.



Wear supportive footwear. Non-slip shoes with good support can make a big difference in stability.



Know your risk. Talk with your healthcare provider if you've fallen before or feel unsteady. Early intervention can help prevent more serious incidents.

By addressing risks and staying proactive, older adults can reduce falls and continue to enjoy active, independent lives.

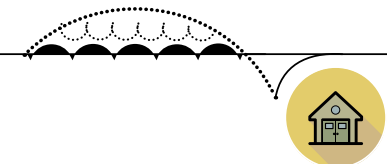

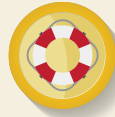

Housing Help for Older Adults

There are several programs in Marin County to help older adults afford and maintain rental or homeownership. You'll find additional information about these programs in the Housing Assistance subcategory of this section.



Section 8 Housing* (Housing Choice Voucher Program)

This subsidized rental program helps very low-income older adults pay fair market rents, with households generally paying about 30% of their income toward rent.



Public Housing* Affordable rental units managed by Marin Housing Authority (MHA) are available to eligible low- and moderate-income residents, including older adults.



Community Action Marin Provides housing case management, rental assistance, eviction prevention, and housing navigation services for low-income and at-risk residents, including help with deposits, rent or mortgage payments, and referrals.



West Marin Community Services Provides rental assistance for older adults living in West Marin to help them remain in their homes and community.



Marin County's Coordinated Entry System 473-HOME (473-4663) Connects individuals and families sleeping outdoors, in vehicles, or without stable housing to outreach teams, emergency shelters, and housing resources.



Below Market Rate (BMR) Homeownership Program First-time home buyers can purchase specified units in Marin County at prices below market value.

Low-Income Senior Rental Properties Sites like Bradley House, Casa Nova, and Cecilia Place Homes offer rental housing for older adults and people with disabilities with rents set at approximately 30% of income.



St. Vincent De Paul Society Operates a Housing Help Desk where Marin County residents experiencing homelessness can be assessed for housing options (including shelter referrals). May also provide limited financial assistance, such as bus tickets or gas checks, car registration support, DMV ID vouchers, help returning to a previous residence, and clothing vouchers.



Ritter Center Offers rental assistance, case management, and supportive services to prevent homelessness and help vulnerable residents maintain housing stability.



North Marin Community Services Provides emergency rental assistance and supportive services for low-income residents in Novato and North Marin.

Independent Living

Independent Living Housing complexes often have a maximum or minimum income eligibility requirement. Residents must be 62 years or over and pay either 30% of their adjusted income for rent or an affordable housing rent established by the facility. The availability of units changes monthly.

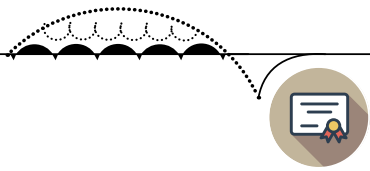

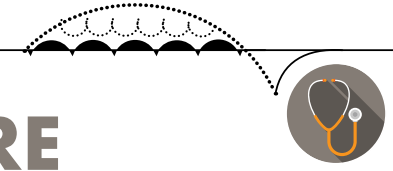

LONG-TERM CARE

Some older adults prefer to stay in their homes as long as possible, with support from Home Care or Home Health Care. Others decide that moving out of the home is more cost effective or offers more safety, social connection, or peace of mind. Long-Term Care provides a variety of options for those who choose to move out of the home to receive care, with varying levels of daily support and medical oversight.

This category includes **Residential Care Communities and Homes** (also known as **Assisted Living**), **Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNFs)**, and **Continuing Care Retirement Communities (CCRCs)**. CCRCs are included here because they offer a continuum of care that can adjust as needs change, while you'll find **Independent Living Communities** in the **Housing section**, as those communities are primarily designed for older adults who do not require ongoing personal or medical support.

Continuing Care Retirement Communities (CCRCs)

Continuing Care Retirement Communities (CCRCs) are licensed to provide independent living, residential care, and possibly skilled nursing all at the same location. CCRCs typically offer contracts that guarantee a continuum of care when needed without having to move to another community setting. Some CCRCs offer on-site dementia care, while others may require residents to move to a different community or facility if dementia care becomes necessary. The initial and monthly fees charged by CCRCs vary depending on the terms of the agreement.

Residential Care and Continuing Care Retirement Communities can offer safety, social opportunities, and relief from household chores.

- **Lifestyle:** Enjoy social activities, outings, and a built-in community to ease isolation.

- **Care on Hand:** Residential Care provides daily support, while Independent Living offers amenities and convenience without personal or medical care.
- **Moving Help:** If you decide to move, there are professionals who specialize in downsizing, packing, and relocation for older adults, helping make the transition smoother.

BALANCING YOUR PRIORITIES

Ask yourself:

- **What matters most?** Independence, safety, social life, or affordability?
- **How much support do I need now, and how might that change over time?**
- **What resources** (financial, family, community) **do I have to support my choice?**

Whether you decide to stay at home with added support or move to a community that better fits your needs, the most important thing is to choose the path that supports your well-being and quality of life.

Residential Care (Assisted Living)

Residential Care Communities, also known as **Assisted Living Facilities** and **Residential Care Homes/Board and Care Homes** (when referring to the smaller 4-6 bed homes), are licensed to provide primarily housekeeping, meals, personal care, supervision, or medication management. Medicare and Medi-Cal do not pay for residential care in Marin County. The monthly fee for residential care can range from \$6,500 for a shared room to \$10,000 or more for a private room. Some require an entrance or community fee.

Residential Facility Check List

Use this checklist when touring a community or facility to help evaluate whether it fits your needs.



General Atmosphere

- Is the facility warm and hospitable?
- Do residents appear active and engaged?



Physical Environment

- Are the exits marked and secure?
- Is the furniture clean and in good repair?
- Is it free of unpleasant odors?



Food Services

- Are menus posted and meals nutritious?
- Are dietary needs accommodated?



Rooms

- Is there adequate lighting and space?
- Is the bathroom accessible and clean?
- Is in-room laundry available?



Social Areas

- Are there common spaces for activities?
- Is private phone use available?



Services

- Are outings and religious services available
- Are Long-Term Care Ombudsman posters displayed?



Staff

- Are staff friendly and trained in First Aid?
- Do staff understand resident needs?



Financial

- What's included in the monthly fee?
- Are personal funds protected?



Safety

- Are fire extinguishers visible?
- Are meds stored safely?
- Is there an alert system in place in case of a resident emergency?
- Is there an evacuation protocol in the event of an emergency, such as a fire or earthquake?



Which Type of Long-Term Care is Right For You?

Q I am living independently and don't need any assistance in my daily living or personal care, but I want to be around others in my age range for social interaction.

A **INDEPENDENT LIVING COMMUNITY** Sometimes referred to as a 55+ community. *Please see the Housing section to browse Independent Living communities.*

Q My mother needs help with several activities of daily living but she cannot afford assisted living. What other options are there?

A **SKILLED NURSING FACILITY** (If someone is Medi-Cal eligible and needs help with activities of daily living and has the support of a physician for placement in a skilled nursing facility, Medi-Cal may pay for her stay with a share of cost.)

Q I am mostly independent, but I do need non-medical help with some activities of daily living (ADLs) such as bathing, dressing, and medication management.

A **RESIDENTIAL CARE**

Q My father recently had a fall and needs 24-hour medical care to recover. What type of housing option should I discuss with his doctor?

A **SKILLED NURSING FACILITY**

Q I am currently active and living independently, but I want the peace of mind to know that I can transition to higher levels of care (such as Residential Care and maybe skilled nursing) if my needs change.

A **CONTINUING CARE RETIREMENT COMMUNITY**

Q My loved one is living with memory loss or dementia and needs 24/7 care and supervision from providers experienced in dementia care.

A **RESIDENTIAL CARE** Individuals with dementia can be cared for by most residential care communities whether or not they provide a dedicated "Memory Care" area.

Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNFs)

Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNFs), also known as nursing homes, convalescent centers, or post-acute centers, are licensed to provide medical care for individuals that qualify for a nursing home-level of care as determined by a physician. Nursing home care includes short-term rehabilitation and long-term care. Short-term nursing home stays are typically paid for by Medicare after a three-night hospital admission. Long-term care stays are typically paid for by Medi-Cal, but private pay is also accepted. Not all nursing homes in Marin County accept Medicare or Medi-Cal and some are part of a Continuing Care Retirement Community.

Access to reliable transportation is essential for maintaining independence and staying connected with the community. Whether you need fixed-route public transportation (buses, trains, or other public transit services that operate on scheduled routes and stops), paratransit service (specialized transportation options designed for individuals who are unable to use regular public transit due to age, mobility challenges, or other factors), community ride programs, or transportation to and from your medical appointments, this section provides a range of options to help you get where you need to go.
