**Organizational Overview: Provide a brief description of your organization including mission, programs, number of clients served, etc.**

The mission of the San Geronimo Valley Community Center is to foster healthy communities within the San Geronimo Valley and Nicasio by providing an inclusive, diverse and dynamic center for locally based human services, arts and culture, education, health and wellness, and community building. Human Services Programs provide assistance to low income, unemployed, disabled, seniors, homeless individuals, youth and families in the San Geronimo Valley and surrounding areas. Our safety-net services include food assistance, referrals to county services, health and nutrition education and parent education.

The Center's Food Bank is offered twice a week and we offer a special holiday food distribution. This program directly addresses the disparities in access to nutritious healthy food for low income families, children and individuals. On average we serve 500 individuals and families per week. Food Bank recipients include seniors, low income individuals, families with children, and people who are unhoused. Every Monday we host our Food Bank at the Center following our Senior Lunch and on Thursdays we have a pop-up drive through no contact Food Bank model. Our Senior Programs include a once a week Senior Lunch that provides an affordable and nutritious lunch through our contract with the Community Action Marin Community Kitchen. Our Congregate meal offers seniors a place to socialize and make community connections with their peers. Our extensive senior programs include activities for seniors that are ongoing and free including exercise classes, dance and movement, pingpong, peer counseling, chair-yoga, Senior Tea & Cookies, writing, and Mahjong. On average our Senior programs serve about 200 seniors. As co-leads of the West Marin Community Response Team (CRT) and in collaboration with HHS, we continue to collaborate to four Health Fairs in the Fall. Fairs provide free vaccines and access to health services with a focus on un/underinsured and low income people living in our communities.

Our youth programs include free 0-5yrs Playgroups, after school childcare for grades TK-8th, after school tutoring, a youth job training program, and a variety of rotating enrichment classes. 40% of our participants receive partial scholarships to our programs. Our youth programs provide nutritional snacks that are supplemented by food provided by the food bank. Our youth programs serve over 300 youth and families providing engaging activities and healthy afterschool activities. Additionally, the San Geronimo Valley Community Center serves as a co-lead of the West Marin Coalition for Healthy Youth (WMCHY), brings together local non-profits, law enforcement, school districts, and community partners that together work to prevent underaged substance abuse. All of our youth programs integrate access to other services and county referrals if needed. All of our programming is provided with a non judgemental inclusive approach. The San Geronimo Valley Community Center is committed to serve community members from the time they are born until they are aging, providing basic health services, food security and services for children, youth and parents. We also curate art shows and great community events that enrich the lives and well being of our community.

Regular access to healthy food is at the core of healthy child development, ensuring that children have the nutrition they need to thrive physically, academically, and socially. CBDG funding will directly support low-income children and families through our Food Bank, addressing disparities in access to nutritious meals while fostering family self-sufficiency. Each week hundreds of children are fed through the Food Bank creating more equity in our community for low income youth to reach the same developmental markers as their peers. The Food Bank also plays a critical role in making our childcare and youth programs both affordable and sustainable by providing fresh, healthy food that is integrated into daily meals and snacks. Our afterschool teen center, The Loft, offers cooking classes twice a week using Food Bank ingredients, teaching children how to prepare simple, nutritious meals at no cost. These classes introduce youth to new foods, including culturally diverse ingredients, while promoting lifelong healthy eating habits and basic cooking skills. By utilizing Food Bank resources, we reduce overall program costs, allowing us to provide scholarships to 40% of participating families and ensuring that children from low-income households have equitable access to high-quality afterschool and childcare programs. Furthermore, food security alleviates financial stress on parents, enabling them to be more engaged in their children's lives and creating an environment where children can achieve the best academic and developmental outcomes. With CDBG funding, we can continue to provide essential food support, ensuring that well-fed children and families build a strong foundation for a healthier, more resilient future. This project directly addresses priorities approved by the Countrywide Priority Setting Committee providing Basic Health Services, Children, Youth and Parent Support Services and Food Security. The constant growth in food bank demand reinforces the importance, impact and necessity of this project.

Our organization aligns with the grant priorities of children and youth services by addressing disparities in access to nutritious food, a fundamental need that directly impacts early childhood development, family self-sufficiency, and the affordability of childcare programs. Our Food Bank serves low-income children and families by ensuring regular access to healthy meals and snacks, which supports academic readiness, physical health, and overall well-being. Creating equity amongst children in our community.

By integrating Food Bank resources into our childcare and afterschool programs, we help keep program costs low and provide scholarships to 40% of participants, ensuring equitable access to high-quality care for families facing financial hardship. Cooking classes in teen programs promote healthy eating habits, introduce youth to culturally diverse foods, and equip them with essential life skills in meal preparation—all of which contribute to long-term family self-sufficiency.

Additionally, by alleviating food insecurity, we help reduce financial stress on parents, enabling them to be more engaged in their children's education and development. Parents who are not burdened by food insecurity are better able to participate in their children's learning, access childcare, and support their family's long-term stability. With this grant funding, we can continue to expand our efforts to ensure that all children, regardless of income, have the nourishment they need to grow, learn, and thrive.

**How will this project Affirmatively Further Fair Housing?**

This project will Affirmatively Further Fair housing by supplementing the expensive cost of food so families can afford housing in our community. We partner with local nonprofits that address the critical housing needs in West Marin. In collaboration with the Two Valleys Community Land Trust, we offer information on affordable rentals in the area and programs to supplement income or make necessary improvements. We also collaborate with CLAM- Community Land Trust Association of West Marin of Point Reyes. CLAM offers information about low-income housing and requirements. In collaboration with these local nonprofits, we provide current information and best practices for homeowners and renters. With families able to have their food needs covered, they free up income for their housing costs to be able to stay in the community and keep children engaged in low cost childcare and activities through the Community Center.

Overall food bank participation continues to rise and our budget demonstrates the full cost and full participation of entire food bank program . This funding specifically narrows in on child and families participating in food and how our programs utilize food bank food to keep child care programs low cost.

**How does your organization verify client income? Income verification is required except if the client is presumed benefit by HUD. Presumed benefit applies to abused children, battered spouses, the elderly, adult persons with serious disabilities, the homeless, illiterate persons, and migrant farm workers.**

Clients' income at our Food Bank is self determined income verification. Federal income levels are posted and clients self determine income based on family size. The majority of our clients that we serve at the Food Bank fall into the presumed benefit category by HUD. Over 50% of our clients qualify as a presumed benefit.

Childcare scholarships undergo a application and income verification process before approval.

Past projects focused on broader community services through our Food Bank program, serving people throughout a lifetime by providing local and free food access. Past project goals and accomplishments using CDBG funds were all accomplished. Our goal continues to be to provide free accessible food, resources, and Human Service resources to families and individuals living in the San Geronimo Valley and Nicasio. Our goal remains serving low-income to very low-income people in our community and through this year's project scope we have narrowed in on children and families to address disparities in early childhood equity. We meet these goals on a weekly basis, serving families and individuals, and providing a safety net to people living in rural West Marin. We are committed to providing food security, basic health services and supporting children and families.

All funds have been used at this time.

**Describe your organization's experience with administering grants and specifically federal grants.**

The San Geronimo Valley Community Center has a decades long track record of effectively administering federal grants. We have clear financial processes to ensure money is being allocated based on deliverables being met. We lead several contracts and comply with all reporting and compliance requirements.

**Describe who will supervise and manage the project and their past experience with project management.**

The Director of Programs (DOP) will directly supervise and manage this project. The DOP has had more than fifteen years of experience in coordinating and managing these services. Duties of the DOP will include supervision of staff and volunteers, providing materials to promote events or services offered in English and Spanish, coordination with our communication staff to include information and resources to services on the Community Center's social media, schedule health education and parent education classes, make announcements of community events, as well as offer translation services if needed. The DOP coordinates with afterschool childcare staff to maintain a continued supply of healthy nutritious snacks for children and oversees the cooking programs, scholarship applications, and all youth programs.

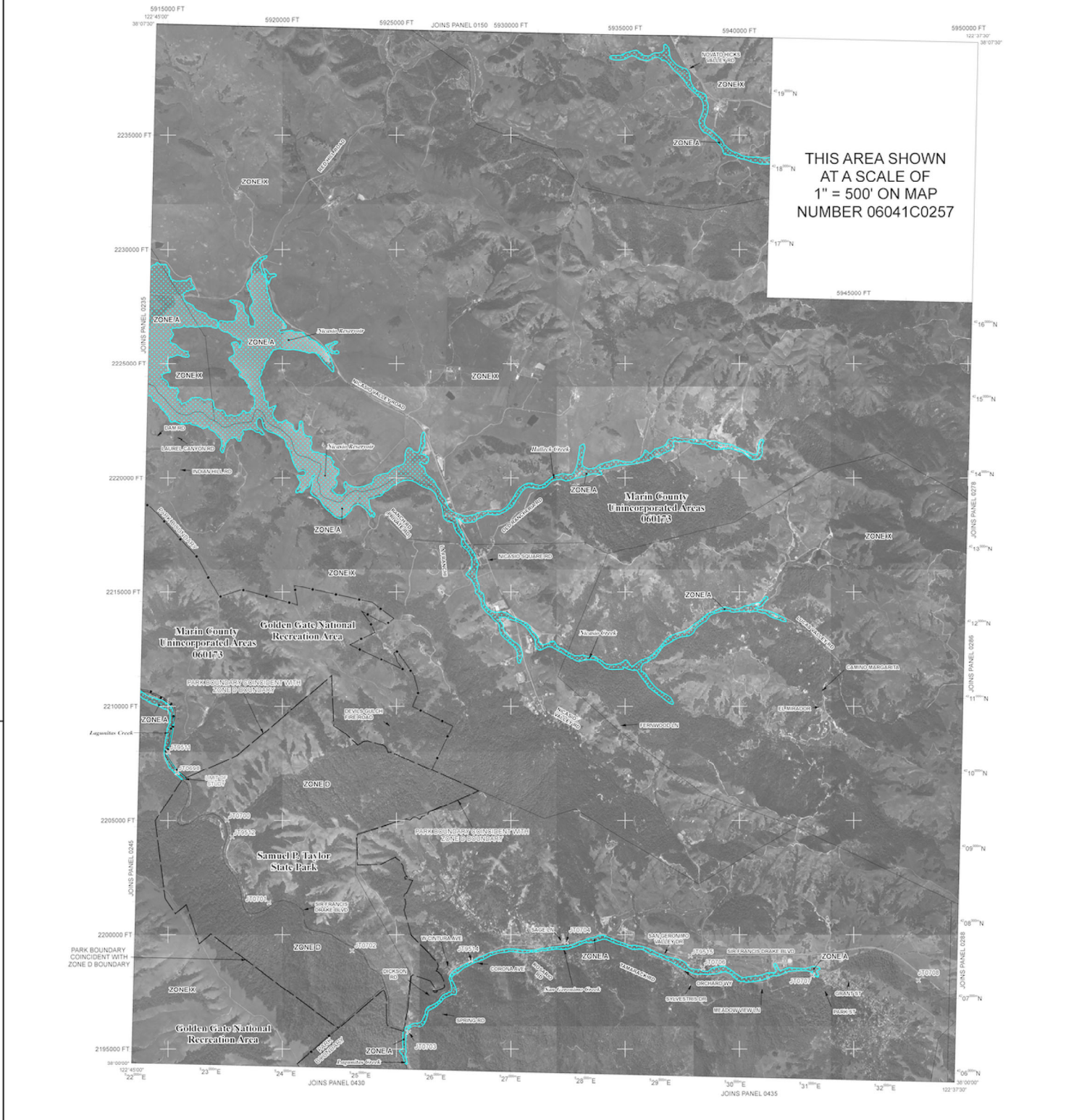

**SPECIAL FLOOD HAZARD AREAS SUBJECT TO INUNDATION BY THE 1% ANNUAL CHANCE FLOOD**

The 1% annual flood (100-year flood), also known as the **base flood**, is the flood that has a 1% chance of being equaled or exceeded in any given year. The Special Flood Hazard Areas shown on this map are subject to flooding by the 1% annual chance flood. Areas of Special Flood Hazard are designated as follows:

- ZONE A** No Base Flood Elevations determined.
- ZONE AH** No Base Flood Elevations determined.
- ZONE AD** Flood depths of 1 to 3 feet (usually areas of ponding); Base Flood Elevations determined.
- ZONE AR** Special Flood Hazard Area formerly protected from the 1% annual flood by a flood control system that was subsequently determined to be inadequate for protection from the 1% annual chance or greater flood.
- ZONE A99** Area to be protected from 1% annual chance flood by a Federal protection system under construction; no Base Flood Elevations determined.
- ZONE V** Coastal flood zone with velocity hazard (wave action); no Base Flood Elevations determined.
- ZONE VE** Coastal flood zone with velocity hazard (wave action); Base Flood Elevations determined.

**FLOODWAY AREAS IN ZONE AE**

The floodway is the channel of a stream plus any adjacent floodplain areas that must be kept free of encroachment so that the 1% annual chance flood can be carried without substantial increase in flood heights.
